Four Themes and Eight Characteristics

Theme One

The Turn Inwards

1. Mystical

2. Spiritualist

A tendency to reject physical images, sacraments and ceremonies and turn inwards to emphasise the inward/spiritual over the outward/physical in the religious life.

Theme Two

The Kingdom's Come

3. Perfectionist

4. Antinomian

A tendency to reject the 'yet to come' and 'after death' emphasis of mainstream Christianity in favour of an affirmation of the possibility of living in the kingdom of God (at least partially) in the here and now.

Theme Three

Spirit Empowered/Embodied

5. Charismatic

6. Prophetic

A tendency to raise the importance of the Holy Spirit over the authority of tradition and scripture, leading to a spiritually empowered and visibly embodied witness.

Theme Four

Looking Back-Looking Forward

7. Primitivist

8. Apocalyptic

A tendency to criticise and reject the 'apostate' and 'corrupt' church of the day, and seek inspiration instead by looking back to the purity of the early church and/or looking forward to the promised transformation of all things in the final age.
